# The Mystery Of James Dean

The great rock group Eagles had a hit song in 1974 titled "James Dean." The hook was "Too fast to live, too young to die, bye-bye." The song was released 19 years after Dean's death while driving his Porsche 550 Spyder and failing to avoid a nearly head-on collision September 30, 1955. It serves as just one example of the enduring grip Dean still holds on American culture. Why does this actor, who died after making only three films, still matter? [Full disclosure: I was born the day James Dean died, though I don't believe in reincarnation.] One reason is all of Dean's films are very good. He was nominated posthumously for his debut in a Best Actor Oscar role portraying Cal Trask in Elia Kazan's 1955 adaptation of Nobel-prize winner John Steinbeck's 1952 epic novel East of Eden, about the struggle between good and evil in Salinas in central California, where Steinbeck grew up. This film co-starring Julie Harris introduced America to a young actor unafraid to improvise, holding his own against experienced actors, a newcomer who embodied the alienation teens felt in the period of time just before rock and roll would rule. This was the only film Dean would live to see.

"Rebel Without A Cause" (released just after Dean's death) was hugely popular with angst-ridden teenagers, both male and female. Despite being the only film he was not nominated for a Best Actor Oscar, many critics think it it his finest performance, as his misunderstood character Jim Stark brings out the best in his appealing but naive love interest Judy, expertly portrayed by the Best Supporting Actress Oscar-nominated 16-year-old beauty Natalie Wood. There is a famous scene where

Dean, a cat-quick natural athlete at only 5'8", 150 lbs., gets the better of a much bigger bully in a switchblade fight. This was filmed with real knives and chain mail vests to heighten the authenticity of the encounter.

Dean's final film, garnering his second Best Actor Oscar nomination was "Giant" (1956), another adaptation of a 1952 best-selling novel, this one from Pulitzer-prize winner Edna Ferber's multi-generational epic tale of Texas. Dean took the role because he wanted to break away from typecasting—the angry, confused teen roles he played in his first two films. He portrayed Jett Rink, a ranch hand who rises to an oil tycoon. The image of Rink smothered in black gold underneath a gusher celebrating the best moment of his life—instant wealth—is a classic moment in this popular movie co-starring old pros Elizabeth Taylor and Rock Hudson, who are often upstaged by the scene-stealing Dean.

According to Fortune magazine, the estate of James Dean takes in a cool \$8.5 million a year these days. Dean's simple look of white T-shirt and jeans, set off by a cigarette dangling from his mouth, has influenced untold millions of young men in America and across the globe. His deliberate and successful attempt to keep his public guessing as to his sexuality just added to his appeal. With the passage of time, his lovers male and female have emerged to establish that he was indeed bisexual. But that takes a backseat to the more important fact that James Dean was cool without even trying to be.

Cynics say early death was a good career move for James Dean, but his legions of fans can only wonder what other great performances he would have delivered had he lived as long as other great actors of his time.


#### **Doris Smith**
